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# **Presidents Message**

Aloha Team Kūpuna Shed!

As we conclude our first year at Lana Lane it is a time for reflection and celebration for an exceptionally successful year. As I recently noted, so many have contributed so much, and I am very pleased and proud of this Shed of ours. It is time for those who have worked so hard to reflect with pride and satisfaction over what YOU have done. Well done and thanks so very much - your support is greatly appreciated and is reflected in our membership growth having gained over 70 new members in 2024!

Looking ahead as we enter the new year, we have some very challenging mandates to work through. First, as many of you are aware, our lease at Lana Lane will terminate in May 2025 with no exception. We have always known our lease would be short term and temporary although we had also hoped there would be an extension .... sadly, this is NOT the case. Hence, we must find a new location and move again.

We established a "Relocation Team" of 12-13 members who have been meeting regularly since October. The sub-committees and focus areas include:

- 1. Searching and finding a new location at least a temporary place for 3-5 years in the core urban area and then, a permanent location if the initial space is not available. More than 10 locations have been reviewed so far (some possibilities, but nothing firm yet)
- 2. Establishing a PR team to present to organizations who may be willing and able to help (more than 30 agencies identified so far, 5 presentations made)
- 3. Determining the spatial requirements for our new location (in progress, nearly finished)

Concurrent with our moving activities, we are looking toward the Shed's future. Specifically, we have begun the following activities associated with a new Atherton grant:

- Seeking legal advice on how to move forward as a non-profit (in progress and ongoing). We recently received a \$15,000 grant to help fund this. (See the article on grant success.)
- 2. Seeking funding alternatives and plans (just starting).
- 3. Developing a new business plan to ensure longevity and durability (just starting).
- 4. Enough of the tough stuff. Happy New Year to you all. Well done and thanks so very much!

#### **Shed Relocation Update**

The Kamehameha Schools (KS) property management firm has confirmed that the Shed must relocate before May 31, 2025 and we are working to identify and secure a new home. We are grateful and offer a Mahalo Nui for the generosity and support from Kamehameha Schools this past year. At this time, we have a few leads and some amazing assistance from within our community network. If anyone has any leads for new space from within their own personal networks, please notify Bob Speer, rspeer2021@gmail.com or Jim Maskrey jmaskrey8@gmail.com and we will follow up with our relocation team.

We plan to hire movers for the "BIG" stuff, and possibly more items. Here are details of our current plans:

- 1. We will cease operations after March 31 to concentrate on packing and preparing for the move.
- 2. All personal stored items must be removed no later than April 1st. Personal items remaining will not be moved and risk being lost in the building demolition.
- 3. In order to eliminate our remaining inventory of "products"- cutting boards, frames, bowls, and some of the wood in our inventory, we seek members to form a Retail Sales Team. Sales could be via Craigslist, eBay, Instagram, FB market place, etc. Sales revenues will provide resources to defray the costs of moving and restarting. Please contact Bob or Jim if you can work on this team.

Obviously, the scope of this mandate is significant and this will necessarily be an "all-hands" effort. All the help we can muster will be needed and appreciated to ensure the Shed's successful move and long-term viability.

#### 2025 Grant Success

The Shed is grateful to have been awarded our second Atherton Grant. This year the intent of the \$15,000 award is to help the Shed prepare for future growth by retaining professional legal, business and tax consulting. We want to upgrade our 501(c)(3) status to accommodate anticipated growth in revenue. We also seek recommendations for short, medium and long term business plans that would position us to better reach out to potential donors and sponsors.
